New C8?

There has been a lot of discussion concerning whether the C8 Corvette will be a mid-engine design. Here is an article submitted by Jerry Craig from MSN.com.

It seems a mid-engine <u>Chevrolet Corvette</u> has been in the works ever since, well, ever since there was a Corvette.

After joining GM shortly after the 'Vette's debut in 1953, Corvette chief engineer Zora Arkus-Duntov soon began scheming for a mid-engine version. He understood the responsive handling afforded by such a layout, but despite numerous internal design studies over the ensuing decades, some development stops and starts, a few mid-engine Corvette concepts, and always-rampant rumors that a mid-engine package was "right around the corner," no such car ever materialized. During development it seemed the current Chevrolet Corvette C7 might finally take up the mid-engine mantle until budget considerations axed the project.

Now the rumors are alive again, especially since the introduction of the mid-engine Ford GT at the Detroit auto show. An intriguing prototype has been spied, and Chevy insiders aren't swatting aside the giddy conjecture it's caused. More to the point, a mid-engine Corvette at last makes business sense. As

evidenced by our track drive in the Corvette Z06, 650 hp is nearing the limits for a front-engine design to handle. What's more, a younger generation of potential buyers doesn't care that "a 'Vette has to look like a 'Vette." Probably they'd rather its proportions more closely resembled a McLaren. Or a Ferrari. Or even a Porsche Cayman.

Due date? If the project doesn't stall, look for a mid-engine Chevrolet Corvette to bow as a top-tier model of the Corvette C8 in 2017. A version of the current small-block V-8 is almost assured; a dual-clutch transmission with shift paddles on the steering wheel will likely also appear. Were he still around, the "Father of the Corvette" would love the rumored name for the mid-engine car: Zora ZR1.

The Corvette team has done a great job over the generations of fostering the brand and building mystique around Corvette.

Corvette owners are fanatical, whether they're able to afford the newest and greatest model, or they buy the hand-me-downs.

Corvette is the only supercar brand in the world where the financial success of its top model actually depends on people who can't afford them.

Huh?! Here's how it works.

The guy who buys the 2015 Z06 took great care of his 2008 Z06, because that is what Corvette guys do.

A guy like me will probably come along and buy it for close to \$30k once the '15 Z06 hits.

I will sell my 2006 Corvette for \$20k—probably to a guy who owns a C5.

That guy will sell his C5 for \$12k to the guy who has a C4.

That C4 will go to a young, first-time Corvette buyer for around \$5k, who will probably pinch himself because he was looking at clapped-out Hondas for the same money.

The whole thing is dependent on an eager, ready-made market for the outgoing model (and even older models), a market that nobody promotes better than Corvette with its regular parade of upgrades, updates, and special editions.

It's probably the one documented instance of trickle-down economics working as advertised.

The whole idea of taking care of your Corvette for the next guy is the cornerstone of Corvette ownership, and this phenomenon only happens because of the feeling of pride passed along with every Corvette.

It doesn't matter if you've got a lowly '76 model with a 140hp L48—you are still beaming as you roll down the highway.

Every time a new Corvette rolls out of Bowling Green, the entire Corvette universe sits up and takes notice; it means everybody is getting an upgrade—even the guy who had been shopping for a dull commuter car.

I'm going to make an easy prediction: With ZR1-like performance at a cut-rate Z06 price.

The new 2015 Z06 is so good, all the top Corvette enthusiasts will have to have it.

Team Corvette has made it so fast, so sexy, and so fuel efficient that it will be irresistible to anyone with a heartbeat and a credit rating high enough to make the payments.

From past experience, Chevy will make the Z06 within reach of a surprising number of people with a price that will make—in an instant—all its supercar competitors guilty of grand larceny.

You could hate Corvettes and it wouldn't matter.

This Z06 is so earth-shattering, it will force everybody to up their game.

Once again, free upgrade for everybody, courtesy of Chevrolet."

More on the Z06 via Don Giovanoni by way of GM Authority

As if the C7 Corvette Stingray wasn't already great, the Corvette team dropped a bombshell with the C7 Z06. We experienced it firsthand, but it looks like consumers want a taste of the well-priced supercar too.

Corvette Chief Engineer, Tadge Juechter, recently went on the record to <u>deny mid-engine Corvette rumors</u>, but wasn't coy about sharing the fact forty percent of <u>C7 Corvette</u> orders are for the Z06. The interview on Autoline after Hours focused mostly around the C7, where he went into detail about where the <u>Z06</u> has come from in 1963.

When Juechter was asked about sales on the Corvette, it was all good news.

"We've been selling at kind of a great rate. We started last fall with the manual transmission cars, we just started a few weeks ago actually, shipping automatic transmission cars. And right now, 40 percent of our orders are Z06s."

He also revealed about eighty percent of Z06 orders are for the coupe variant, while twenty percent of buyers are opting for the convertible. Sounds like a <u>C7 Z06 Convertible</u> might be the next future classic. In terms of transmission take, Juechter says it's too early to tell, but he expects it to hover around the traditional numbers of sixty percent automatic and seventy percent manual.

I found this among my archives and thought I'd pass it along to some of our newer members. I think I found this shortly after I got my car. If you are ever on the CorvetteForum.com, you will occasionally see some pretty heated topics when somebody doesn't get a wave and is highly insulted.

The Corvette Wave is an integral part of the mystique and culture of the Corvette owner experience. Corvette owners who wave at fellow Corvette owners when they pass on the road show a mark of recognition that you are among the elite group of intelligent people who are driving America's True Sports Car. A Washington U. professor can't get enough of the venerable Chevy sports car. He's got 18 to prove it.

Owning a Chevrolet Corvette is cool. So what does that make Jerry Craig, who just bought his 18th Vette?

Very cool.

Even better, Craig picked up his new black beauty at the Corvette factory in Bowling Green, Ky., on June 23 — 50 years to the day that he bought his first Vette.

"I've loved them since they came out in 1953," said Craig, 72, an engineering graphics professor at Washington University. "I got this newest one in black because my first one, a '58, was black."

While the colors of the 16 others have varied,

Caig grew up in Kirkwood and while at Kirkwood
High, Craig weatched with interest when Chevrolet
announced it was going to produce a European-style,
two-seaterspaorts car.

"Chevy shipped a brand new 1952 Corvette here to compete in a sports car race," Craig said. "So a couple of friends and I went to Smartt Field in Boschertown (in St. Charles County) to see this car race. It lost badly, but I fell in love with it."

Craig has been a member of the St. Louis Corvette

Man has passion for sports car

Club since 1959 and served as president in the early 1960s.

What makes the Corvette special? Craig said the use of fiberglass for the body is its single biggest asset. "It gives designers the ability to create a body shape that you simply can't if you use metal," he said.

After graduating from Washington University, Craig, single and 22, was driving a Ford station wagon.

"I had a buddy — who drove a Porsche — who nagged me about my car," he said. "He said I was an idiot for driving a wagon and said I needed something cooler."

Only three 1958s sat on the Chevy lots in St. Louis. Craig liked the black one at Feld Chevrolet in Maplewood the best.


"It cost me \$3,341.46," said Craig, who still has the window sticker.

Fifty years later, the car Craig picked up in Bowling Green has a sticker price of about \$62,000.

Craig and his wife, Armynta, a retired nurse, live in Ellisville with a cat and several older Vettes. Their two grown children own Corvettes, as do a handful of their brothers and sisters.

Now, Craig owns 3½ Corvettes; he shares a two-tone brown 1978 with his son, Jeff.

Seven members of the clan went with Craig to Bowling Green to pick up the latest addition to the fleet. They all were there when the car rolled off the line and Craig drove it away.

"All of the workers came and shook his hand; it was quite nice," Armynta said.

Craig still teaches at Washington University but has retired from teaching at St. Louis Community College at Forest Park. He also writes engineering textbooks. Far from a breezy read, one book contains a section entitled "Sketching Isometric Pictorials for Orothographic Projection."

"T've written three textbooks and they're in use at about 230 colleges," Craig said, smiling. "Those are what pay for all the

Over the years, Craig grew to love more than just the looks of the car. Its engineering excellence also impressed him. His new one, which has a 427-cubic-inch V-8 engine, got an astonishing 28 miles to the gallon on the trip back from Bowling Green,

he said.

The Craigs, married for 42 years, agree that the iconic two-seater is partly responsible for their successful marriage.

"It only has two seats — no room for a mother-in-law or any kids," he said with a laugh. "It's the perfect car for you and your wife to get away."




